JUSTICE AND PEACE NOTES

Many activities wind down for the summer or cease altogether, but outreach to people in need takes no vacation. In July, we had a very successful blood drive with 52 units of blood donated. We kept the Red Cross technicians busy all afternoon, and they were very appreciative for the turnout of donors. Thanks to everyone who came to donate their blood, even if you were unable to do so at the time. Thanks also to blood drive volunteers, Bonnie and John Cholish, Mike Dorchak, and Bill Fitzpatrick for giving of their time to make everything run smoothly.

August was school supply month when supplies were collected to help needy children be ready for the beginning of the new school year. Thank you once again to Cheryl Turner for coordinating this event and delivering all the supplies to CHIP/Healthy Families whose case workers distribute them. Thanks also to all who donated supplies.

Our monthly food collections continued as the need for food increases during the summer months because supplies dwindle. We maintained a steady volume throughout the summer. Everyone is encouraged to participate throughout the year whether you bring a couple of items or a full bag. While we have set the third weekend of each month as food collection weekend to facilitate delivery, food may be brought to the church at any time. Please keep your food item selections simple and easy to prepare. When in doubt, you can never go wrong with canned meats, soups, pasta, cereals, canned fruits and vegetables, and especially peanut butter and jelly. Personal hygiene items such as bath soap, toothpaste, and shampoo are also good selections.

Our Chesapeake Habitat Interfaith Partnership (CHIP) completed its last house in January. We have not started a new one since that time because we have not been able to acquire land. However, some in our group have kept busy assisting a Norfolk group as they have three houses under construction and were short on workers. The houses are side by side on Halifax Street, just one block over the Norfolk line in South Norfolk. They hope to have one house completed in November. We will continue Habitat fundraising so that we are ready, financially, when we do acquire a building site. Please watch for Habitat events and support them so that we may continue to build affordable homes.

I have been active in Justice & Peace work since the beginning of our parish in June 1997 and have served as chairman since January 1999. I have informed Msgr. Mike that I am stepping down as Justice & Peace chairman, but will remain active in some outreach work. I have thoroughly enjoyed coordinating our outreach programs and appreciate all the great volunteers with whom I have worked. New coordinators have agreed to conduct individual activities such as Thanksgiving, Advent Outreach, Gifts from the Heart, School Supplies, etc. We still need someone willing to chair the Justice & Peace ministry for our parish and work with Msgr. Mike to help plan future endeavors. The work is extremely rewarding and has endless possibilities. If anyone would like to discuss the position, please contact Msgr. This is the story of Johamson. He lived with his father (his mother had left them both) before he moved to the Maison Fortune Orphanage. Unfortunately, he lost his father due to a violent death as a result of the political unrest in Haiti. Because Jean Louis, the orphanage director, had known the father and remembered always seeing Johamson sitting on his dad's lap, he decided to take in the child. That was several years ago. He is now around seven years old. Margaret and I remember Johamson from our first visit in November 2004. He was such a tough little guy, always picking fights with boys who were much older and bigger than he. He seemed a little withdrawn around the visitors. Thankfully, we have seen a real transformation with Johamson over the years. He gets along much better with the other boys, and we have not seen him pick on anyone in a long time. He is much more apt to join a group game with visitors and communicates much more with them. Now that there are younger boys at the orphanage, he has been seen being protective of them a lot.

The orphanage has done wonders for Johamson and others like him in need. Continued support is extremely important so that we may continue to help the children in Haiti. Please support the orphanage so that all of these boys can continue to grow and become better citizens of Haiti.

A five-year campaign to raise financial support for the orphanage will be launched at a reception and dinner on October 19th at the Portsmouth Renaissance Hotel. Orphanage director Lefort Jean-Louis and his wife will be guests of honor. All are invited to attend. There is no charge for the dinner, but guests will be asked to make a financial contribution to further the good work being done at the orphanage. NEWS FROM COMMUNITY LIFE

It has been a continuing goal of the community of St. Stephen, Martyr to provide support and comfort to those who are ill or bereaved. I thank one and all for their support of this ministry both with their time and with food donations, and I look forward to continuing to work with you and for you.

Given the nature of the event, we usually have just a couple of days notice of a funeral being planned and the subsequent reception offered to the family, and quick action by a group of volunteers is necessary to accomplish this ministry's purpose. Currently, our seniors group has been carrying a large part of the load of setting up, preparing food, working the reception and cleaning up, as well as assisting at the liturgy itself, as needed. As their name implies, they truly are the "amazing" greys!

I would like to supplement and spread the workload a little bit more, and I am asking for additional volunteers from the community at large. A usual scenario for a funeral reception runs like this: We try to set everything up the day or evening before, depending on the week's schedule for the building. On the day of the funeral, we arrive early and get the kitchen in gear to tray up the food that has arrived or will be arriving and to also do last minute preparations. We work the reception and end with cleaning up and returning the tables and gear to their assigned areas. Any volunteer would not have to commit to the entire process, but the arrival of a few fresh faces towards the end of a long day would be an immense help. It is truly a wonderful ministry, and I urge anyone interested to attend one of the services just to become acquainted with the work that is done. We receive lots of wonderful comments from visitors and parishioners alike and the bereaved families are very grateful for taking this one responsibility off their shoulders during their time of grief.

I am also asking for a few more phone coordinators to call the parishioners of the various small communities as food is needed. It is hard to be at church setting up, scheduling workers, and arranging food donations simultaneously. Because time is of the essence and having experienced other ministries that are working well via the internet, I could also use some assistance in exploring the possibility of having this ministry join the electronic age and making it more efficient for reaching out to everyone in the parish via internet.

Because funerals and illnesses can provide short notice, I appreciate the difficulty for almost everyone to provide a food donation when a call is received at the end of a very long work day. Please consider the following suggestions.

1. Food does not have to be home-made. Instead, you could place an order for a deli tray or other dish from one of our local markets. Or you could order a take-out item and let us know when and where to pick it up. Chicken is always popular.
2. Providing cold cuts and/or cheese and a package of rolls/bread/crackers is a great substitute for finger sandwiches and cheese trays. We can prepare them at the church.
3. Provide a couple of seasonal fruits or vegetables and we can cut and prepare a fruit tray or veggie tray on the day of the reception.
4. Two-liter sodas are always needed. Please stick with regular or diet colas, lemon-lime, or ginger ale. Too many different flavors get confusing.
5. Provide bagged greens, salad toppings, and dressing. We will toss a salad for you at the church.

I welcome your comments, suggestions, and your offers of help. Also, please remember that this ministry requires all of us to work together to care for all of us. Please call the church office if you are in need of our assistance or contact Fran Holden at 482-7863.

The origin of the halo surrounding the head of a saint's image has a pre-Christian history. It was used among the Greeks and Romans as a symbol of divinity for their gods and goddesses and in particular Apollo, the sun god. It was also used to distinguish Roman emperors on their coins. The halo was adopted by Christians in the 4th century as a sign of sanctity in images and mosaics. To distinguish Christ from the saints, the halo around Jesus' head included a cross.

BLAZE

Set your Faith on Fire

What is Blaze?

Blaze is a catechetical model of life-long learning of our faith. Everyone in the parish is invited to join Blaze whether you have school aged children or not. Blaze is an opportunity to share a meal, get to know fellow parishioners, and deepen your relationship with Jesus Christ.

Why Blaze?

For the past 50 plus years the focus of parish Christian Formation has been on children and teens. In paragraph five of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (November 17, 1999) "Our Hearts Were Burning Within Us", A Pastoral Plan for Adult Formation states, "Adult formation, by which people grow in the life of Christ through experience, reflection, prayer, and study, must be "the central task in this catechetical enterprise", becoming "the axis around which revolves the catechesis of childhood and adolescence as well as that of old age."

Who does BLAZE include?

Blaze includes all parish households. Single person households, households with or without children and empty nesters are invited to join Blaze. Life-long learning is for everyone in the parish. Nursery will be available at each session after the meal and pre-school aged children are invited to participate.

How often does BLAZE meet?

Blaze will be offered once a month. Households will have the choice each month to flex which day of the week best suits their needs. Blaze will always start the first Sunday of the month and run through Wednesday. You will choose only one of those days to participate. You will be given an opportunity to sign up three weeks prior to the Blaze week. Every household will be asked to help with the monthly session, for example; bringing in a supply item, hall monitor, set-up, clean up, roles in the monthly program, etc.

How can I register for BLAZE?

We will hold Blaze/Christian Formation Registration September 15 & 16 and September 22 & 23 after all masses. Registration will also be taken during the Christian Formation Office hours Tuesday – Thursday from 9 am to 4pm after September 15, 2007.

Blaze Registration Costs?

*The registration fee before September 27, 2007 is \$25.00 per participant with a maximum of \$100.00 per household. **Please note any registrations received after September 27, 2007 will be increased to \$40.00 per participant with a maximum of \$160.00 per household. Inability to pay the registration fees should not prevent you from registering – as always.***

When does Blaze begin?

*We will begin October 2007. Each month Blaze will begin the first Sunday and run through Wednesday. Sunday's and Wednesday's sessions will be from 4:30pm-6:30pm. Monday's and Tuesday's sessions will be from 6:30pm-8:30pm. Each session will begin with a pot luck meal. **This meal is not optional.** Following the pot luck, the group will gather for a prayer service and break into small groups for sharing.*

Are text books needed?

High school students will need to use their Catholic Faith Handbook that was purchased and used last year. All rising 9th graders will be asked to purchase the handbook at \$20.00 per book. Supplemental material will be sent home with each household.

Sacramental Preparation:

The immediate preparation for First Reconciliation, First Eucharist and Confirmation will be separate from the Blaze program. Participants in these programs are expected to be enrolled in Blaze.

What is Pathways?

*Pathways is a catechetical training certificate program required by the Diocese for all adults who plan to teach in the church. **Pathways is required for facilitators of adult study and family models such as Family Faith.** There are three levels of Pathways; children, youth and adult. The materials needed to complete the program are provided by the church.*

Pathways Workshops

If you plan to teach in any of the models of Christian Formation you must be Pathways Certified. Pathways can be taken on-line, with a group at a workshop provided by the church or independently at church. Please pre- register for Pathways with Kim Kirkby by email or phone. The next workshops are scheduled for Saturday, September 15th from 9am to 2pm and Tuesday, September 18th from 9am to 2pm.
